THE HOLY FACE

A devotion was first presented to Sr. Mary of St. Pete in Tours, France in 1843 by our Lord Jesus Christ. Jesus revealed to her a powerful devotion He wanted to be established throughout the world - The Holy Face Devotion. The purpose of this Devotion is to make reparation for the sins of the world - specificall the sins of blasphemy, irreverence, and profanation of Sundays and Holy Days. After many years and struggles, the devotion was approved by the Church thorities. The Confraternity of the Holy Face Devot was established on October 25, 1884, and elevated to an Archconfraternity on October 1, 1885, by Pope Leo XIII



A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR Fr. KEVIN DREW

We continue reading through Genesis at Daily Mass ...

I set my bow in the clouds to serve as a sign of the covenant between me and the earth. Genesis 9.1.13 (Wednesday of 6 th Week of Ordinary Time)

After disembarking the ark, Noah built an altar and offered sacrifice to the Lord by burning every clean animal and every clean bird. And the sacrifice was a pleasing odor to the Lord. Thus, a covenant was established by God, stating He would never again destroy the earth by a flood.

There is a painting outside the confessional in Excelsior Springs called Pieta by William Adolphus Bouguereau. Pieta is from the Italian for pity. The word has become associated with images of the Virgin Mary holding her dead Son. Here is a description of this painting:

The Pieta, 1876, provides a very unique depiction of this most famous of imagery. The weeping Mary cloaked in a robe of black is mourning the death of her son whom she holds to her chest. The dead body of Jesus limply hangs in her arms while eight weeping angels surround them. The angels are clad in the colors of the rainbow and create an arc over Mary and Jesus.

In the Old Testament, after the great flood, Noah and his family saw an arcing rainbow, a sign from God that the flood was over and the world could be born anew. In Bouguereau's Pieta, the rainbow symbolizes that the sacrifice of Jesus was complete and that the human soul can be born anew and ascend to God after death.

Bouguereau painted the angels the color of the rainbow because Christ is the new Noah who offers sacrifice to the Lord. But not only is He the new Noah, He is also the ark. St Augustine wrote: *The door open in the side of the ark surely symbolizes the open wound made by the lance in the side of the Crucified — the door by which those who come to Him enter in the sense that believers enter the Church by means of the sacraments which issued from that wound.* (City of God, 15, 26).

And not only is Christ the new Noah, the captain of the ship, He is also the victim offered on the altar. Like the clean animals, Christ is the clean oblation, the pure offering that pleases the Father.

St Bede wrote: Just as Abel consecrated the start of the first age of the world by means of sacrifice to God, so Noah began the second age. Then after recalling the sacrifices offered by Abraham, Melchizedek, and the patriarchs of the Old Testament, Bede wrote: All those sacrifices were figures of our supreme King and true priest who on the altar of the holy cross offered God the host of His body and His blood. (Navarre)

It's interesting about blood: In the covenant with Noah, God stated that every creature alive was His and his descendants to eat. But they could not eat the blood. *Only flesh with its lifeblood still in it you shall not eat*.

But in the final and everlasting covenant we eat flesh with its lifeblood still in it. We eat the Lamb of God, the clean oblation with the pleasing fragrance to the Lord. We drink the blood that issues from Christ's wound; the blood that devastates the earth by flooding it with divine mercy, so it can be born anew.

WEEK 4

Too often, God's grand plan for marriage, family and life is left for children to figure out on their own. Today's culture can easily lead your children the wrong direction about these ultimate joys of life. Therefore, it is paramount to be intentional to discuss with your children the plan God has for their marriage, family and life.

The 6th Commandment offers you the opportunity to be intentional in setting a vision of a future marriage and family for your children, according to God's plan. Explain to them the proper order of life, beginning with meeting someone, the proper way to date and getting to know if a person might be the right husband/wife that will help them to, one day, be together in heaven. Then, explain how, through the Sacrament of Marriage, a couple is ready to begin having children and raise them according to God's plan for abundant life.

To help your children begin to envision their future family, have them draw a picture of what their family might look like. Be sure to encourage them to include God in the picture, as the most important Person in their family. Having drawn their picture, ask them a few questions to help them appreciate how their choices in life can make their future a reality, or threaten it. Here are some questions to help get the conversation started.

- 1. What would your future husband/wife be like?
- 2. How do you become the person your future husband/wife would want you to be like?
- 3. Do you pray for your future husband/wife?
- 4. What would your prayer for him/her be?
