

## A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR FR. KEVIN DREW



## FEAST OF ST. MATTHEW, SEPTEMBER 21ST

Jewish tax collectors in Israel were extortionists (criminals, crooks). They were assigned a collection quota by the Romans who ruled over Israel, and whatever they collected beyond that quota they could pocket. Tax collectors enriched themselves by ripping off their fellow Jews. Tax collectors' reputations were so bad that even the Gentile (the non-Jews) wanted nothing to do with them. Their fellow Jews hated tax collectors so much that they would refuse to marry into a family that had a tax collector. Tax collectors were also banished from religious worship and shunned in all affairs of civil society and commerce.

St Matthew was a tax collector. He was a wealthy crook. And in Capernaum, Christ's adopted home on the Sea of Galilee, Christ called Matthew away from that life. Capernaum must have been Matthew's home too, so Matthew probably knew Christ by reputation or perhaps had seen Him and secretly admired Him. One scholar wrote Matthew may even have nourished a kind of envy for Jesus' disciples, poor but blessed and beloved by the people, while he, with his little piles of gold and silver coins in rows on the table before him, was looked upon as some sort of mangy dog. So, Matthew had been prepped for the moment that would change his life, when Christ passed by, stared into the depth of his soul, and said "Follow me." And so, the low-life tax-collecting Matthew, a hated member of society; a huge sinner did just that. Can you imagine what went through Matthew's head? He knew who and what he was. And he knew that everyone else knew. Matthew figured he was beyond any kind of redemption. He had no hope. Yet to his shock, and everyone else's, the master chose him.

Bishop Sheen wrote: *Love of the sinners was a new thing on earth.* If Christ Ocame uniquely to be a teacher, He would have given us a system and told us to learn and practice. But since He came to be a Savior and to give His life "as a ransom," He summoned men to a purging of evil: I have not come to call the just; I have come to call sinners to repentance.

Matthew understood he was a sinner. That's what saved him. After Christ's death and resurrection, most likely at the urging of Jewish converts, Matthew wrote a short history of Christ's life. Can you picture Matthew as he sat in a quiet room somewhere writing his gospel? Can you picture him silently reflecting on all that had happened to him and the world since Christ came and went? In the 10th chapter of his gospel Matthew listed the twelve Apostles, starting with Peter, then James and John followed by the rest. When he got to his own name, he added a little something behind it: *Matthew - the tax collector.* That's right. Matthew, the low-life, the extortionist. Perhaps that page became tear-stained as Matthew reflected on his past - before Christ saved him.

What a beautiful gift Christ and St Matthew give us. They give us hope. Christ didn't come to call the righteous; He came to call sinners. So, we have to prep for His call. We have to silently reflect, and be ready for the moment He stares at us, poor sinners that we are; stares right into the depths of our souls, and says: Follow me.

## **SEVEN SORROWS OF MARY**

Mary, full of sorrows, remember the anguish you felt in your heart during the suffering and death of your Son, Jesus Christ. Intercede for us and obtain for us the grace to endure our trials with faith and courage.

1. The Prophecy of Simeon (Luke 2:25-35): Simeon's prophecy foretold the suffering Mary would endure, predicting that a sword would pierce her heart as she witnessed the future trials of her son, Jesus.

- 2. *The Flight of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph into Egypt* (Matthew 2:13-15): The Holy Family's escape to Egypt to save Jesus from King Herod's massacre was a time of fear and hardship, reflecting Mary's anguish in protecting her child from danger.
- 3. The Loss of Jesus in the Temple (Luke 2:41-52): Losing Jesus for three days in Jerusalem brought immense sorrow and anxiety to Mary and Joseph as they searched for their beloved son, only to find him in the temple.
- 4. Mary Meets Jesus on the Way of the Cross (Luke 23:26-32): Encountering Jesus as He carried His cross to Calvary, Mary felt the weight of His suffering, sharing in His agony and pain.
- 5. Jesus Dies on the Cross (John 19:17-30): Witnessing the crucifixion, Mary stood by Jesus' side as He took His final breath, her heart breaking with each moment of His
- 6. Mary Receives the Dead Body of Jesus (Luke 23:50-56): Holding her lifeless son in her arms, Mary experienced profound grief, yet remained steadfast in her faith.
- 7. Jesus is Placed in the Tomb (John 19:38-42): The sorrow of laying Jesus in the tomb marked the culmination of Mary's suffering, as she said goodbye to the physical presence of her son.
