RORATE MASS, DECEMBER 6, 6:30 AM EXCELSIOR SPRINGS

The Rorate Mass takes its name from the opening words of the Introit, which comes to us from Isaiah 45:8: "Rorate, caeli, desuper, et nubes pluant justum, aperiatur terra, et germinet Salvatorem."

"Drop down dew, ye heavens, from above, and let the clouds rain the just: let the earth be opened and bud forth a Saviour."

The Rorate Mass is lit only by candlelight. Because it is a votive Mass in Mary's honor, white vestments are worn instead of Advent violet. In the dimly lit setting, priests and faithful prepare to honor the Light of the world, Who is soon to be born, and offer praise to God for the gift of Our Lady. As the Mass proceeds and sunrise approaches, the church becomes progressively brighter, illumined by the sun as our Faith is illumined by Christ.

A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR FR. KEVIN DREW



Never forget that there are only two philosophies to rule your life: the one of the Cross, which starts with the fast and ends with the feast. The other of Satan, which starts with the feast and ends with the headache.

That is a quote from Venerable Archbishop Fulton Sheen (d 1979), who grew up outside of Peoria, IL. A young man discerning a call to the priesthood cited the quote from Sheen in a recent column about Advent. The young man has some good points. He writes:

Contrary to popular protestant belief, we are not yet entering into the joy of the Christmas season. The materialism that leaves so many of our friends and family dry and burnt out by December 25 has no place for the Catholic soul.

I think of my good friend who worked in a grocery store for several years. As soon as Thanksgiving was over, his manager put on the Elvis/Mariah Carey Christmas mixtape. Needless to say, it wasn't a holly jolly time of the year for

The Church expresses the true mood of these times liturgically by wearing purple vestments. Can you think of another time when the Church is bedecked in purple vestments? Lent.

The purple (in actuality "violet") vestments denote penance, sorrow, and contrition. Historically Advent was known as "Little Lent." Advent was (and theoretically still is) a penitential season, albeit not as severe as Lent, in which the focus is on Christ's passion and death.

, weeks of Advent – that would be 75 percent of Advent – we focus more on \mathfrak{P} Christ's second coming. That is the one that involves our judgment. So, in the dark of winter we meditate on this and do the wise thing by turning our penitential practices up a notch. We get to Mass more often, we go to Confession, we pray more and give alms.

Another good practice is to fast a bit. That can be quite difficult in a post-Christian world. It can be challenging at office parties or family gettogethers to constrain ourselves from overdoing it on food, drink, and festivities. The added challenge comes when we consider that Christ warned us not to call attention to ourselves when fasting or giving alms.

With all that said, we should find creative ways to do so anyway. Just because Christ told us not to call attention to ourselves in regards fasting and almsgiving is no reason to forego it altogether. And doing so will help us remember the actual reason for the season in a world that has long forgot

For the next two Sundays at Mass the Church has us out in the desert with John the Baptist - just like in Lent. Isn't that interesting? The Baptist's message was "repent," as in "penance." So let us do that. Let us go out to the desert darkness during this "Little Lent" and fast a bit and give alms.

And let's do so joyfully - because a light shines in the darkness, and the darkness does not overcome it (In 1:5). Let us make Advent Catholic and spare ourselves the headaches. Let us joyfully start with the fast, and end with the feast.

HOLY SOULS IN PURGATORY

The month of November is dedicated to the Holy Souls in Purgatory. The Church commemorates all her faithful children who have departed from this life, but have not yet attained the joys of heaven. St. Paul warns us that we must not be ignorant concerning the dead, nor sorrowful, "even as others who have no hope ... For the Lord Himself shall come down from heaven ... and the dead who are in Christ shall rise.

The Church has always taught us to pray for those who have gone into eternity. Even in the Old Testament prayers and alms were offered for the souls of the dead by those who thought "well and religiously concerning the resurrection." It was believed that "they who had fallen asleep with godliness had great grace laid up for them" and that "it is therefore a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead, that they may be loosed from sins." We know that a defiled soul cannot enter into heaven.
