A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR FR. KEVIN DREW



Creator of the Stars at Night

CREATOR of the stars of night, Thy people's everlasting light, Jesu, Redeemer, save us all, and hear Thy servants when they call.

The chant *Creator of the Stars at Night* was written in the 9th century, if not before. And the present melody was written in England in the 11th century.

Tragically, in the 16th century Christendom was shattered to pieces. Countries like Germany, England, Holland, Switzerland, and Sweden threw off their Catholic past and heritage and began a new order of things. Liturgically, this meant throwing out Latin hymns, chants and prayers, and replacing them with new vernacular songs and vernacular liturgies which featured presiders instead of priests and fellowship meals instead of ritual sacrifice. The transformation of worship paved the way for the transformation of the culture, and ushered in our modern secular world.

In 19th century England there arose the Oxford Movement. Church of England (Anglican) priests began studying medieval England (before it became Protestant). They also studied the writings of the Early Church Fathers, like St Augustine, Jerome, and Ambrose. Many of these English priests became Catholic, the most famous being John Cardinal Henry Newman, who coined the phrase: "To be deep in history is to cease to be Protestant."

The 19th century Church of England priest John Mason Neale translated *Creator of the Stars* from the Latin. It was known as *Conditor alme siderum* and had been chanted for centuries at Vespers (Evening Prayer) in the Church, especially in Advent. Neale became a prolific translator of such ancient hymns, and in doing so he incurred the wrath of his fellow Protestants who accused him of being an agent of the Vatican. Today, Neale's most popular Latin translation is of *Veni*, *Veni Emanuel*, which had its beginnings in the 8th century. We know it as *O Come*, *O Come Emmanuel*.

Creator of the Stars and O Come O Come Emmanuel are known as plainchant or plainsong, a form of chanting that emerged around 100 AD. Taking its cue from the Jewish synagogue and temple, plainchant does not use any instruments for accompaniment, but only voices. This was the only type of music allowed at Mass for the first several centuries. The Church taught that the music should make those listening reflect on spiritual and not secular things. That was why the melody was kept pure and unaccompanied.

The Church still teaches this. Popes throughout the 20th century and through Benedict XVI have urged for a return to simple chants at Holy Mass. Not only does it promote active participation, these chants sound like "church." They sound holy, and thereby help us to enter into the sacred mysteries in a more reverent manner. Another term for reverence is "fear of the Lord." Chanting at Mass then is more important than most people realize. As Scripture states: *Near indeed is His salvation – to those who fear Him.*

Near indeed is the Creator of the stars at night, the people's everlasting light. And so we chant: *Jesu, redeemer, save us all, and hear thy servants when they call.*

THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION

The month of December is dedicated to the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary. "From all eternity God chose with infinite wisdom the woman who would be the Mother of His divine Son. To prepare for the Word Incarnate a spotless and holy tabernacle, God created Mary in grace and endowed her from the moment of her conception with all the perfections suited to her exalted dignity. St. Thomas teaches that through her intimacy with Christ, the principle of grace, she possessed beyond all creatures a fullness of divine life."

"Mary alone — 'our tainted nature's solitary boast'— never saw her soul's purity darkened with the dust of any stain, nor did she see in any part of her triumphal course toward heaven any sin or trace of worldliness. By a unique and singular privilege from God she was preserved from original sin from the first moment of her Immaculate Conception; by another privilege derived from the first, the Lord did not permit her ever to be stained even with those unavoidable failings of human weakness." — Luis M. Martinez
